This national competition showcases posters and a brief video created by early career healthcare professionals on six areas of liver educational focus: disparities in liver disease, fatty liver disease, liver cancer, liver transplantation, pediatric liver disease and rare liver disease. Senior liver experts will guide our competitors through the creation of their poster/video. **Competitors are tasked with translating complicated medical information into a poster which can be easily understood by patients or the public.** Posters will be reviewed and scored by a formal panel of judges comprised of ALF National Medical Advisors, patients, caregivers and friends of ALF. The competition website will be open to visitors who will be encouraged to vote for their favorite poster. The poster with the most votes will receive the People's Choice Award. 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How to Get Started

Step 1: Topic Request and Approval

Choose your category:

1. Disparities in liver disease
2. Fatty liver disease
3. Liver cancer
4. Liver transplantation
5. Pediatric liver disease
6. Rare liver disease

A list of topics for that category will be forwarded. This step is REQUIRED to ensure your topic/ title selection is available.

Step 2: Prepare Content and Materials

2. Your poster must be **4,224 pixels wide x 3,168 pixels high** and must include the header provided above.
3. Please export and upload your posters in **.jpg** or **.png** formats.

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Video Recording Tips

Your Phone is Best

If you have an iPhone or an Android phone they have excellent cameras, so if you're able, use a smartphone

Landscape is Great

Turn your camera 90 degrees to record in landscape mode. Make sure you can position phone/camera so that it's close to eye-level.

Use the Lens

If you're using the selfie camera it's generally dead center at the top of your phone. If you're using the rear camera there may be more than one, ask your friend to let you know which one you should be looking into. And don't forget to pretend you're speaking with us directly. If it helps, imagine you're talking to all of us, or even better, a close friend.

Check Your Light Source

Natural light tends to have a warmer "feel" than many artificial light sources, but make sure the sun is NOT in your eyes. If it's dark, look for a light source that's diffused (a lamp with a shade ideally - ideally not florescent blue light). Position it behind your phone so your face is illuminated without shadows and glare. If the light source is too bright, consider using a scarf or some sort of thin fabric to soften it but make sure that fabric isn't adding a color to your face. Most importantly, try not to have any bright lights behind you as you'll appear in a shadow and the image will be difficult to use.

Plan and Practice

It can be helpful to write out what you'd like to say in outline form, bullet points, or on cards. Practice out loud a few times, you can even record and watch yourself if that helps. BUT be mindful that the best video of you is going to be the one where you're connecting with us through the camera not the one where you're reading off a script or trying to remember your outline. We want to feel like you're speaking directly to us.

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Upload Instructions

Step 1: Go to <https://wetransfer.com>

Please note you may be prompted to sign-in or subscribe. This is not required.

Step 2: Upload Your Files

On the left-hand side of the screen, there is a circle with a plus sign in the middle. This is where you upload your recording and your poster graphic. You can drag and drop the files there or click on the words "Upload files" to select from your folder. Please save your files as your name, category (i.e.- L Cannon, Liver Cancer)

Step 3: Fill in the Blanks

Enter the recipient's email address in email to, your email address, the title, and a message. All emails should be sent to lcannon@liverfoundation.org for submission. In the title field, please add your name and your full poster title. For example, Jane Smith, Cholangiocarcinoma, What You Need to Know. For the message field, please include your name, Institution, and poster title (i.e. – Jane Smith, XYZ University Medical Center, Cholangiocarcinoma, What You Need to Know). As soon as the file is uploaded and you fill in these sections, you may hit Transfer and it will send.

Step 4: Enter Your WeTransfer Code

Before sending your files, WeTransfer will verify your email address. This is standard with WeTransfer. You will receive a six-digit code via the email you provided. This code is active for 60 minutes, and you can request a new code.

Step 5: Emails from WeTransfer

You'll receive two emails after sending data through WeTransfer. The first email message includes a confirmation that your file transfer has been sent, and the second one comes when the recipient downloads the submitted file. The files are available for download for seven days before being permanently deleted.
